Guest lecture: - Ethics in Homoeopathic Practice: Training for Students and Teachers

Dr. Patil Pradeep, MD Homoeopathy, Professor and Head of Organon of Medicine Department, Late Mrs. Hausabai Homoeopathic Medical College, Nimshirgaon, is a guest faculty member.

Date: November 24th, 2021.

Dr. Gholap Kamlesh, the Principal of Anantrao Kanase Homoeopathic Medical College, made an invitation to the Guest Faculty, Dr. Patil Pradeep, to recognise students and teaching staff of Anantrao Kanase Homoeopathic Medical College on the ethical elements of homoeopathic practise. The invitation was accepted by Dr. Pradeep Patil sir.

We began our Guest Lecture activities on November 24, 2021, as planned, in the seminar hall of AKHMC and H. The guest professor arrived in the lecture hall at 10:00 a.m. The guest faculty was greeted warmly by Dr. Gholap Kamlesh, the Principal of AKHMC. He discussed the activity's goals and objectives. He went on to introduce the event's distinguished visitor, Dr. Patil sir, whose 17 research articles had been published in peer-reviewed journals. Dr. Patil sir is a Professor of Organon of Medicine, and as the department's head, he is in charge of the department's responsibilities.

Dr. Patil sir, a guest lecturer, began his talk by encouraging our students to pursue a career in homoeopathic medicine. According to him, the disease is represented by the totality of symptoms, and the name of the medical condition is of little use in homoeopathic practise. He supplemented the teacher's expertise by stating that homoeopathy is founded on "inductive logic," and that it is crucial to educate pupils the practical implications of inductive logic. He did so by using basic examples. He went on to say that such scientific homoeopathic treatment is ethical, and that students should be encouraged to employ a variety of Materia Medica resources to treat sick people. He went on to say that small groups of students should be prepared to show practical application of Materia Medica at Homoeopathic Medical College Hospital inpatient and outpatient departments. 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describing Homoeopathy as a scientific system of medicine founded on various fundamental principles. These natural principles aid in the restoration of health in a rapid, gentle, and lengthy manner. He incorporated in all students and professors the importance of Hahnemann, the pioneer of homoeopathy, in the application of the "Law of Similars," despite the fact that this law was well known before Hahnemann.Hahnemann demonstrated the medications' ability to cause a sickness that was artificially identical. He also went over other important concepts including the law of minimum dosage and single dose, among others. Dr. Patil sir went over the opposite side of the coin, explaining the various issues that can arise while implementing the law of similars. He discussed issues such as a lack of symptoms, persons' immunocompromised states, and issues relating to illness situations such as the HIV/AIDS window period.

Dr. Patil sir supplied various sources for prescribing homoeopathic remedies, including aphorisms 272, 273, and 274 from the Organon of Medicine. Similarly, he provided instances of several stalwarts' statements, which are useful in ethical homoeopathic practise. He also talked about the adverse events of homoeopathic drugs and educated the students on how to avoid them. The guest faculty gave a motivational and inspirational presentation to our college's students and teachers. The lecture's key takeaways were proper bedside training for homoeopathic students and the ethical practise of homoeopathic medicine.



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
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
